This template can be used for multiple purposes:

• It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated Primary PE and sport premium guidance.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Schools must also outline what the impact this funding has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment and how any spending will be sustainable in the future. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2024.**

The Department for Education has worked closely with the Association for Physical Education (afPE) and the Youth Sport Trust (YST) to develop this template and encourages schools to use it. This template is an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.

- Developing play.	Developing our play through hiring play coordinators, buying more equipment and enhancing the school grounds has helped us to encourage more children to meet the Department for Health's recommendations on physical activity and exercise. Our broad play offer gives children with a range of different interests something to do during social times. Teachers no longer get children asking "can I do a job?" because they are fully engaged outside. Children with a range of SEMH challenges tend to find it easier to regulate following their OPAL play times.	Next year, we intend to improve the quality of our resources, so that children engage with them more, respect them more and so that it raises the profile of play, which includes physical activity and sport.		
- Taking part in competitive sports.	Children thoroughly enjoyed our events offer this year, however some children and staff felt the schedule was too intense at times. The events helped us to develop children's personal and sportsbased skills through a range of tournaments. Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

Due to staffing capacity, this was not always possible. 1 of the children will be repeating the swimming program next year to help them meet year 6 expectations.

These children had not previously been swimming and required an intense level of support. Due to staffing capacity, this was not always possible. 1 of the children will be repeating the swimming program next year to help them meet year 6 expectations.
